The Qualification

At the BFI Film Academy you will gain a qualification in "Preparing to Work in the Film Industry" which is accredited by NCFE. This qualification has been designed by BFI to provide you with an understanding of what it's like to work in the film industry. It also gives you the opportunity to gain and develop relevant skills in planning and producing a practical film-based project.

Your Portfolio

To gain the qualification you will create a portfolio of evidence to show your learning throughout the BFI Film Academy. This can either be paper based or produced online and can include the following:

- A workbook/journal
- Video or written blogs
- Finished films and other video content
- "Behind the scenes" film or footage
- Audio recordings
- Annotated drawings and notes
- Worksheets and diagrams
- Scripts
- Photographs
- Presentation slides
- Professional and Assessor written observations and feedback

Academy Support and Feedback

You will have a dedicated NCFE assessor who will support you throughout the BFI Film Academy and provide feedback on the evidence you produce for the NCFE qualification. The portfolio is not graded, you will gain feedback on each section and have the opportunity to add further evidence should it be required. If you have any additional needs or requirements, let your Assessor know and they will be able to offer you further support.

NCFE Support for participants

If you have an issue or complaint then you should raise your concerns with the academy you have attended directly and follow their complaints procedure. If the issue is not resolved you can contact NCFE.

How learner appeals are dealt with?

The assessor will consider your reasons and look again at what you did for the assessment. You will be given a clear explanation in writing within 5 working days. This will either be a new decision or confirmation of the original decision. If you agree with this explanation, the appeal stops at this point.

A centre can submit an appeal on behalf of a learner or a group of learners, with the explicit written permission of that learner or group of learners. Learners and/or their parents or legal guardians are not permitted to submit an appeal directly to NCFE

Making a complaint

Before you make a complaint about one of our centres, please raise your concerns with them directly, following their complaints process. They may be able to help you.

If you're unhappy with their response, please send us a copy of your complaint and any response, and we'll look into it.

Plagiarism

All the work evidenced in your portfolio must be your own. As part of completing the qualification you are asked to sign a participant agreement stating that the work you have submitted is not copied.

Plagiarism is using the work of another person without crediting the source. BFI Film Academy assessors regularly check work produced to ensure it is original and not copied.

If a participant produces work that is plagiarised then learner achievements may be withheld or additional work may need to be submitted by the participant.
